Brunei	2013 has been a landmark year in the fight against corruption in the Sultanate. With a conviction in one of the biggest corruption cases in the Brunei's history - involving Brunei Shell Petroleum, one the largest public bodies in the country - the government intended to make a statement - that even those who occupy the loftiest positions are not exempt from the rule of law. 	The Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) of Brunei Darussalam was established on February 1, 1982. It was at the Opening of the State Legislative Council on December 12, 1981, where His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam announced the formation of an agency tasked to uphold the integrity of public service and to hold accountable persons who have strayed into corruption to justice.	
	"I strongly emphasise the need to uphold integrity and trust based on the teaching of Islam, and I in the strongest term prohibit any form of corruption. Insya Allah, I will take firm actions to prevent any form of corruption among officers in my government," said His Majesty in a titah on that day. Cambodia	Prime Minister Hun Sen issued a statement ordering that anti-graft education be incorporated into the national schooling system as part of a wider effort to stamp out corruption in the country. The statement, released in the lead-up to International Anti-Corruption Day, celebrates arrests that the Anti-Corruption Unit (ACU) has made since its creation in 2010 and calls for the unit as well as other ministries to act further to stamp out corruption. "Corruption prevention and eradication is an endless battle," he added. The anti-graft agency held simultaneous activities with the launching of the University Integrity Tour at the UP National College of Public Administration and Governance (NCPAG) and the holding of the 1st Barangay Integrity Forum in Mangaldan, Pangasinan. Both activities form part of the Integrity Caravan program launched by the Office of the Ombudsman during its 25th anniversary last May. Malaysia

Over 200 people participated in a seminar on domestic and global best practices against corruption held in conjunction with International Anti-Corruption Day. Certified Integrity Officers, senior officials in government, company signatories of Corporate Integrity Pledges as well as civil society representatives participated. The event was organised by NKRA Corruption and Association of Certified Integrity Officers, with the support of UNDP and other partners. Chief Integrity Officer of PETRONAS, Dato' Samsiah Abu Bakar, UNDP advisor Asia Pacific Regional Centre, Elodie Beth Seo and TI-Malaysia Managing Director of the Business Integrity Programme, Dr Mark Lovatt were among the speakers that shared best practices in combating corruption.

Some 350 Malaysians participated in an Anti-Corruption and Forest Governance Walk organised 7 December 2013 by Transparency International-Malaysia in collaboration with NKRA Against Corruption. Myanmar

UNODC (ROSEAP) has worked with the Government of Myanmar in the past to increase the country's capacity to combat corruption. For example, UNODC provided advisory support in the drafting of Myanmar's newly passed Anti-Corruption Law

To commemorate the International Anti-Corruption Day 2013, UNODC (ROSEAP) will work closely with national authorities and UNDP, as well as civil society organizations and the media to promote dialogue on anti-corruption activities and to disseminate anti-corruption messages in line with the United Nations Convention against Corruption.

Through printing and dissemination of ACT themed calendars Myanmar language, UNODC intends to raise awareness of issues related to corruption among different stakeholder including civil society organizations. The calendars are expected to be launch on 20 January 2014.

Launch of the calendar will be accompanied by anti-corruption Public Service Announcements (PSAs) and roundtables through Myanmar MTV TV channel. Details of these have to be further discussed with different partners.

Timor Leste

The Anti-Corruption Commission (CAC) and Civil Service Commission jointly held a conference at the Dili Convention Centre more than 1000 guests to share knowledge in what efforts can be taken to combat corruption. Returning from Panama City for the celebration, Anti-Corruption Commissioner Aderito de Jesus Soares said that he was pleased to see so many people gathered to discuss anti-corruption efforts.

Each organisation held activities ranging from panel discussions aired live on Radio/TV, competitions involving primary and secondary schools, a Walk against corruption, and so on.

Countries around the Pacific held a range of activities on 9 December to raise awareness on the importance of fighting corruption and the role various stakeholders play in this. To mark International Anti-Corruption Day, the United Nations supported Pacific Island Countries to undertake activities that reflect this year's theme, "Zero Corruption, 100% Development". In Fiji, a youth network to fight corruption was launched by Transparency International. In Solomon Islands, a walk against corruption was organized. In Kiribati, Vanuatu, Tonga and Tuvalu, media campaigns, including talk back shows, were held.
